GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. A **Membership Fee** is \$7.00 and is good for one admission daily for the three days of the fair. This constitutes a yearly membership to the Forest Agricultural Society, which entitles the bearer of the Membership entry into the fair and a voice at monthly meetings. When a membership is purchased you will be providing a phone number in order to be contacted to help volunteer throughout the year (see a board member for committee listings).

Memberships can be purchased from the Secretary by attending the Annual General Meeting in January or one of the monthly meetings set for the 1st Thursday of each month from February until July.

Memberships sold after the monthly July meeting will be \$15.00.

2. An **Exhibitor Fee** is \$5.00 and is good for one admission on one day only. This will allow the person so paying and any member of his family living under the same roof to compete in any or all departments, PROVIDED however, that if more than one member of the same family, even though living under the same roof, shall compete in any department or departments against one another, then each person so competing must pay the exhibitor fee as above required, and shall compete under his or her own name. (A \$5.00 fee will be retained for next year's exhibitor fee from each exhibitor winning \$15.00 or more in cash prizes).

Each exhibitor will be furnished with one admission ticket, which is good for one admission one day only. An exhibitor may enter as many exhibits as the rules of the class allow, with only one entry per section allowed in each class unless otherwise stated.

3. A **3-Day Pass** - is \$15.00 and is good for one admission daily for the three days of the fair and is available in the office starting on the Wednesday of Fair weekend or at the front gate on the Friday night.

4. Each exhibitor, shall register to the Secretary, not later than 12 noon, Friday, September 23rd, a list of entries intended for exhibition. Articles entered in Classes 21 to 65 may be brought into the exhibition building from 3:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. on Thursday, September 22nd and from 8:30 a.m. until 12 noon on Friday, September 23rd, 2011. No articles will be accepted before 3:00 p.m. on Thursday, September 22nd or after 12 noon, Friday September 23rd. Livestock

exhibitors' entries will be received up to 12 noon on Saturday, September 24th, and 10:00 a.m. Sunday, September 25th, for Beef. **Please Note that all entries must be listed in the order mentioned in the prize list.** Additional entry forms may be obtained from the secretary. Send lists of entries in, well ahead of time, to avoid waiting in line. Your entry tickets will be ready for you to pick up when you bring your exhibits in.

5. All articles for competition in the indoor departments to be in the showrooms before **12 noon on the first day of the exhibition** and properly located in their own department, and all stock and implements to be on the grounds by 11:00 a.m. on Saturday and 10:00 a.m. on Sunday.

6. All stock and articles must be the bona fide property of the exhibitor.

7. All exhibits in the Homecraft Section must be the work of the exhibitor. The judges are instructed to discard all soiled, defaced or old work and award prizes only to new and up-to-date work.

8. The judges will commence to work at 12 noon on Friday, Saturday and Sunday, unless otherwise stated.

9. Judges have full power to classify all exhibits. The judges are instructed to reduce the amount of premium or to withhold the prize if they consider the best entry in a class to be of inferior quality.

10. Any person or persons interfering with the judges in execution of their duties will be liable to expulsion from the grounds; and their prizes, should they receive any, will be withheld.

11. The decision of the judge or judges shall be final as to awarding prizes and no appeal shall be considered.

12. All parties awarded prizes are requested to take particular care of their entry tickets to avoid any error on the judges' books, and entries must be made for each articles or animal. If you feel an error has been made on your prize money cheque, **please notify the Secretary immediately.**

13. Upon discovery of any fraud or deception as to ownership of any article exhibited or in any other manner, the Board of Directors shall withhold the payment of the prizes awarded.

14. **No animal or articles exhibited shall be removed from the grounds or buildings before 4:30 p.m.** Noncom-

pliance with this rule will result in forfeiture of the prizes awarded to such animals. Indoor exhibits will remain until Sunday at 4:30 p.m.

Note:

All indoor exhibits will be left in the building until Sunday September 25th.

All articles to be picked up Sunday at 4:30 p.m.

15. The Directors of the Association agree to take every reasonable precaution to insure the safety of the animals and articles sent to the exhibition. It must be clearly understood that the owners are to assume all risks. Should any animal or exhibit be accidentally injured, lost or stolen, the Directors will render all assistance in their power for the recovery of same, but they will not recognize any claim for payment of the value or portion thereof.

16. The Society reserves the right to pay the prizes on a percentage basis, if necessary, owing to decreased revenue from rain or other causes.

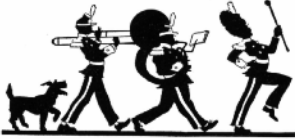
17. In case of a dispute, Class "A" Fair Rules are to govern.

18. The rules governing each market class of exhibits precedes the classes listed.

19. All livestock proof of age must be available.

20. There will be no entry fee for 4-H members showing 4-H calves in the calf classes. Membership will be retained.

21. All cheques will be mailed after November 1st and **must be cashed by December 1st** of the fair year.

D. Upon making an entry into the Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies Quilt Competition, the exhibitor agrees to participate in any promotion activities related to the competition.

E. The winning Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies Champion Quilt will not be eligible to compete in any future District and/or Convention O.A.A.S. Competition.

LOCAL FAIR COMPETITIONS

1. Each local fair is entitled to send only the GRAND CHAMPION QUILT, (min. 72" x 90") judged the Best of Show of all eligible hand quilted quilts to the District Competition.

OR

If any entry wins GRAND CHAMPION or BEST of ALL ELIGIBLE QUILTS at more than one Fair, the other Fairs at which this quilt was entered and won, should enter their RESERVE CHAMPION or SECOND BEST of SHOW of ALL CLASSES quilt in the District Competition.

NOTE: If an exhibitor wins GRAND CHAMPION or BEST of SHOW of ALL ELIGIBLE quilts at other than his/her own Fair, or at more than one Fair, the exhibitor must consider the Agricultural Society nearest his/her home address as the one from which the quilt will be sent to the District meeting.

2. An exhibitor who wins more than one BEST of SHOW title with a different quilt at different Fairs shall be entitled to enter each winning quilt to compete at the District Competition.

3. Local Homcraft Divisions are requested to judge a GRAND CHAMPION or BEST of SHOW of ALL ELIGIBLE quilts. As well as RESERVE GRAND CHAMPION or SECOND BEST of SHOW of ALL ELIGIBLE quilts.

The GRAND CHAMPION and the RESERVE CHAMPION are judged from all first and second prize ELIGIBLE quilts.

DISTRICT COMPETITIONS

1. Judging at the District Competitions will be the responsibility of each OAAS District.
2. The 1st place winning hand quilted quilt from the District Competition is eligible to enter the OAAS Championship Quilt Competition at their Annual Convention. In cases where the winner of the District first prize quilt decides not to enter the Final Championship Competition, the Second Prize quilt winner at the District Competition will be eligible.
3. The OAA Societies will award a ribbon and prize money of \$25 for First place, \$15 for Second and \$10 for Third to exhibitors of winning hand quilted quilts at each District Convention.

O.A.A.S. ANNUAL MACHINE QUILTED QUILT COMPETITION

Eligibility, Rules and Regulations

GENERAL CONDITIONS

- A. Entries must be solely made and machine quilted by the exhibitor and exhibited and judged at a local Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies (O.A.A.S.) Fair to be eligible for this competition.
- B. Quilt to be measured on the perimeter. Total perimeter measurement to be a minimum of 192 inches or 480 cm. Note the article can be square, rectangular, etc.
- C. Judging will occur at local fairs and district levels. A Provincial Grand Champion Machine Quilted Quilt will be

selected at the Annual O.A.A.S. Convention.

D. Upon making an entry into the Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies Machine Quilting Competition, the exhibitor agrees to participate in any promotion activities related to the competition.

E. The winning O.A.A.S. Machine Quilted quilt will not be eligible to compete in any future District and/or O.A.A.S. Provincial Competition.

F. The entry must NOT be quilted using a long arm machine and must be machine quilted by exhibitor.

G. Quilt must have visible machine quilting.

LOCAL FAIR COMPETITIONS

1. Each local fair is entitled to send only the GRAND CHAMPION MACHINE QUILTED article, judged Best of Show of all eligible machine quilted quilt/wall hangings to the District Competition.

OR

If any entry wins GRAND CHAMPION or BEST of SHOW of all eligible MACHINE QUILTED articles at more than one Fair, the other Fairs at which this item was entered and won, should enter their RESERVE CHAMPION or SECOND BEST of SHOW of all eligible Machine Quilted articles in the District Competition.

NOTE: If an exhibitor wins GRAND CHAMPION or BEST of SHOW of ALL ELIGIBLE Machine Quilted Classes at other than his/her own Fair, or at more than one Fair, the exhibitor must consider the Agricultural Society nearest his/her home address as the one from which the quilt will be sent to the District Competition.

2. An exhibitor who wins more than one BEST of SHOW title with a different machine quilted article at different Fairs shall be entitled to enter each winning article to compete at the District Competition.

3. Local Homecraft Divisions are requested to judge a GRAND CHAMPION or BEST of SHOW of ALL ELIGIBLE Machine Quilted articles as well as a RESERVE CHAMPION or SECOND BEST of SHOW of ALL ELIGIBLE Machine Quilted articles.

The GRAND CHAMPION and the RESERVE GRAND CHAMPION are judged from all first and second prize ELIGIBLE Machine Quilted articles.

DISTRICT COMPETITIONS

1. Judging at the District Competitions will be the responsibility of each OAAS District.
2. The 1st place winning machine quilted article from the District Competition is eligible to enter the OAAS Championship Machine Quilting Competition at the Annual Convention. In cases where the winner of the District first place prize machine quilted article decides not to enter the Final Championship Competition, the Second Prize machine quilted article winner at the District Competition will be eligible.
3. Ribbons will be awarded at District Level for First, Second and Third prizes.

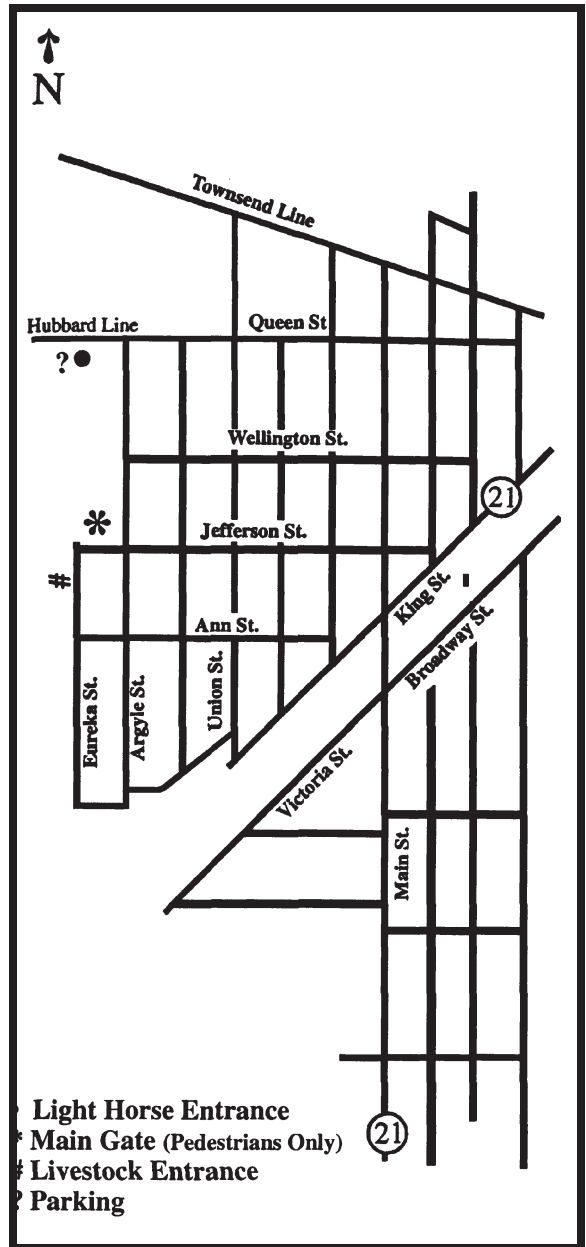
